Curriculum in Action

Take a look at our week of learning in action across the school.

Oak Class

Welcome back to our families, we hope you all had an enjoyable half term. This week in Oak, we started our new story 'Room on the Broom' by Julia Donaldson. We have introduced the main characters and had a great time dressing up as the Witch in the story. We made tasty witches' hats using biscuits, ice cream cones and melted chocolate. We also started looking at verbs and acted out different verbs.



Nursery

In the first week back after the half term, the children enjoyed meeting their friends again and they have explored the new roleplay area: a hospital. We have started to read the 'Dear Zoo' story. We have started with our Phonics learning. The children have been practising good listening skills, and they were listening to different sounds and guessing what made each sound. We have recapped 'King One' in Ten Town and the children have had the opportunity to paint Numberblock number 1 using red paint and a cube. We have learned about Bonfire Night, after which the children explored with paint and glitter to make their own fireworks. Harseerut, in Butterflies group, said: 'when it's night time fireworks come. It's big and it have so many colours. Far away in the sky.' Aadam, in



Bumblebees group added: 'because they're noisy. They look like a rainbow.' In addition, Dinara, in the same group, said: 'they are too loud I saw red firework.' Muhammad, in Butterflies group, said: 'fireworks, in the night time the people makes it, only big people can do it.' On Friday, we celebrated World Science Day, the children dressed up and we made an experiment in the Nursery.

Reception

We have had a fantastic first week back after the holidays, the children have done an excellent job of settling back into the routines. This week, a highlight has been watching the children enjoy immersing themselves in our new topic 'My Community'. We explored different cultures and learned how some people celebrate Diwali and Bonfire night. The children were able to notice similarities and differences between their own celebrations. They developed an understanding of colour mixing and created some wonderful firework art! Over the next half term we will learn more about people who help us in our community. The children have already enjoyed role play using our 'Fire Engine' in the garden and Superhero Headquarters! In Maths we explored different shapes, met number 6 in Ten Town and identified quantities of more and less.



The children showed a great deal of perseverance in Phonics where they are beginning to sound out words to read and write and we are so proud of their progress so far!



Year 1

In Year 1 we have started a new story as part of our English lessons "Lost in the Toy Museum" by David Lucas. After the lights went out in the Museum all the toys woke up and we talked about what the toys might do. We linked this to our History learning about old toys and new toys. We discussed the materials old toys were made of in comparison to new toys. In Maths, we added numbers together and talked about how to add using a variety of resources such as number lines and cubes. In Reciprocal Reading, we started our new story "Biscuit Bear" by Mini Grey and wrote a prediction about what we think will happen based on what we had read. In Geography, we talked about our local area and went



for a walk and talked about what is near and far from school. We looked at Google Maps before we left and talked about our planned route and why routes are important. We had a wonderful Science Day full of amazing costumes and fun Science experiments .

Year 2

This week in Music, we have been practising notes A and C on our recorders. We have been playing along to samba music from Brazil. In Maths, we have been calculating the difference between objects that have more and fewer items. For Science Day we looked at what a scientist is and how they impact different things across the world. In English we have started our new book about The Great Fire of London. We are using our knowledge from History lessons to support us when writing about the past. In History we looked at what happened after The Great Fire of London and compared it with how life was before the fire in 1666. We have engaged with lots of learning in our first week back and are looking forward to the rest of the half term!

Year 3

This week in English, we began our new book, *The Hodgeheg* by Dick King-Smith. The children kicked off the story by making predictions based on the front cover. Many guessed that the book might be about a hedgehog who faces a big challenge, while others speculated that it could be a funny adventure. As we start reading, the children are excited to see if their predictions match the story and are eager to find out what happens next in Max the hedgehog's journey!



In Maths, we have been focusing on adding and subtracting across the hundreds. The children have found the concept of exchanging particularly interesting and challenging, as it requires careful thinking and attention to detail. Despite the difficulty, they have shown great resilience and have been developing new strategies to solve problems, such as breaking down numbers and using place value. It has been wonderful to see their confidence grow as they tackle calculations that are more complex.

This week in RHE, the children have been learning about personal hygiene and the importance of looking after their teeth. We started by discussing the key habits that help keep our bodies clean and healthy, such as regular handwashing, bathing, and wearing clean clothes. The children shared their own routines and learned how these small actions play a big part in staying healthy. We then focused on dental hygiene, discussing why it is important to brush our teeth twice a day and visit the dentist regularly. The children learned about the impact of sugary foods on teeth



and how brushing removes plaque and helps prevent cavities. Through our class activities, they have discovered the correct technique for brushing and flossing.

We would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to all the parents for your incredible support in helping the children dress up for our **Word Science Day!** The costumes were truly amazing, and it was wonderful to see the creativity and enthusiasm that the children brought to this fun and educational event.



Year 4

This week in year 4, children have been excited to start reading their new English text 'The Giant's Necklace'. They have looked at the contextual setting of the text, that being Cornwall, and have found out some facts about this area. Children also made some great predictions using evidence from the blurb on what they think the text will be about. In addition, in our Geography lesson this week, children explored different types of farming and the different goods that are grown in the UK. They discovered the importance of climate and soil on harvesting crops. Moreover, it was great to see children so excited for World Science Day. Children participated in different investigations and learnt more about key scientists. Well done for another hard working week year 4!

Year 5

In Maths, we have been applying our understanding of inverse to work out the missing number. This has helped us understand the fact family used when adding and subtracting. In English we are continuing with our story, 'The Boy At The Back Of The Class'. This week the children looked back at their big writes by reading back their work and editing appropriately by using a range of punctuation, ambitious vocabulary and fronted adverbials to enhance their writing. Meanwhile, in Science, children have been immersed in an exciting learning experience by being part of the celebrations in honour of 'World Science Day'. Children had the opportunity to dress up as scientists whilst exploring a range of experiments. This day helped them use the scientific enquiry skills to solve problems and answer scientific questions.

Year 6

This week Year 6 have come back ready and eager to continue their learning! In English, we finished our text 'War Game' written by Michael Foreman. The children were sad to learn how the story ended for our main protagonists but thoroughly enjoyed the text. They have produced a diary entry, newspaper report and will now begin preparing to write a non-chronological report about WW1. In Maths, we have begun looking at multiplication and division calculation strategies. To celebrate Science Day, we carried out an experiment in Science which investigated how shadows are formed. We also looked at stereotypes within Science, the 10 Science skills as well as the enquiry types. In PE we started our unit on dance; this term we will be exploring the dance style called 'Capoeira' which derives from Brazilian martial arts. Finally, in Geography we continued learning about Brazil this week by focusing on the urban and rural areas within Brazil. Well done for another great week of learning. Have a lovely weekend!




